





In 2006, our parishioners found new and expanded ways to serve those in need. To name a few, our Out-to-Lunch monthly feeding program has expanded, and we are now assisted by First Presbyterian and St. Mary's Catholic Church. Adult members went on a mission trip to aid victims of Hurricane Katrina, while our wonderful youth traveled to New York City to live out the Gospel there with the poor. Our Christmas Episcopal Community Services Adopt-A-Family program was expanded this year and will be again next year. On God’s Mission, The Rev. Mark W. Kelm
Report of The Rev. Marilyn Baldwin

After ordination to Transitional Deacon in June 2006, I began working at St. John’s in late July. My

duties include assisting at worship, providing pastoral care and coordinating adult education; and working with the Newcomers and Evangelism committee, along with providing clergy presence on the Ministry Forum. I spent much of the first few months getting to know the people involved in these committees along with how each of them worked in relationship to the church community.

My first task was to coordinate adult education opportunities for the fall, including both Sunday morning and Wednesday evening forums. With formation activities and leaders already in place, it became a matter of deciding what to offer and to balance one set of opportunities with complementary ones, and to encourage participation by more parishioners. A small education committee became a larger group who helped choose additional opportunities to involve more people. In addition, we offered a special "Body by God" series and an Advent Quiet Day mini-retreat. Plans for early 2007 include offering "Life Keys" on Wednesday evenings, and a series "Experiencing God" on Sunday mornings, and two Lenten series.

Newcomers and Evangelism has responsibility for inviting the community to the Rally Day celebration in the fall, and Lessons and Carols in Advent, along with hosting new member luncheons. Additional options to invite and welcome visitors are being discussed.

The Ministry Forum is an opportunity for the various committees to share information on their activities and plans, and for new ministries to be reviewed and supported whenever possible.

I have also participated in meetings of the Healing Team, BeFriends, and the Grief Group, and plan to attend other groups as time permits in the future. I have found the St. John's community to be warm, welcoming, and supportive, and am looking forward to more opportunities to invite people to deeper relationship with God and God's people.

Organist/Choirmaster's Report

While St. John's musical component can take no credit for the church's new sound system, certainly music is a principal beneficiary. Now, besides the spoken word, all anthems, hymns, the sung liturgy and even the organ voluntaries may be recorded for dissemination upon demand. The system was put to the test initially at the Advent III morning services, and then again at Lessons and Carols that afternoon. Within hours, Lessons and Carols was available on the church's web site. But that in itself is nothing new, thanks to the continuing efforts and expertise of one Dr. David Monyak.

Every year Lessons and Carols seems to be the highpoint of the musical season, and this year perhaps even more so. Even from the perspective of the organ bench, all the elements seemed to jell into a cohesive whole, with no major vexations and few minor indiscretions. The Chancel (adult) Choir

was at maximum strength (and subtlety), and with the addition of three guest soloists, filled the lectern-side choir chancel to overflowing. From the pulpit side was the reinvigorated Youth Choir, singing from memory and following its interim director's every gesture, occasionally alternating stanzas of carols with the Chancel Choir across the aisle.

But before any of this took place, the assembling congregation hushed to less than a whisper as Cellist Daryl Skoba of the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra (and a new member of St. John's) played a Vivaldi cello sonata as the last of the Gathering Music. Having the availability and willingness of talent of this caliber speaks well of the future.

I would be remiss were I to ignore further mention of the Youth Choir (in recent years known as the Children's Choir). A change in leadership brought a new director on the scene in late summer, a young woman who seemed to fit the church's needs ideally. Unfortunately, the match proved not to be as ideal as anticipated, and by mid-October she had resigned, leaving the Youth Choir leaderless. Helen Gehrenbeck agreed to fill the void through Christmas, which she has done with more than nominal success. And now, at year's end, she has agreed to continue serving for the remainder of the school year. While the arrangement involves the current organist/choirmaster more than heretofore, it is one that appears to be working well, as well it should!

A year ago the Chancel Choir hovered around a dozen members on an average Sunday morning. By this fall that number had increased to about 15, with the addition of Jim Berry, Richard Kamla, and Eric Thor. Several additional singers, members or friends of the parish, augmented the choir for Lessons and Carols. What would be thrilling beyond words would be to have a choir chancel that full week after week after week!

BeFriender Ministry

The BeFriender Ministry is a lay pastoral care ministry of listening presence. BeFrienders are trained lay ministers to expand the capacity of our church to provide pastoral care. Every one of us is, at times, on a difficult journey and needs a caring companion who will listen, empathize and be a reminder of a caring community.

The BeFriender Ministry Program at St. John in the Wilderness was re-established in 2006. Rev. Joanie Delamater is a certified trainer from the BeFriender Ministry National Office. She and Rev. Andrew Jensen provided extensive training over a period of 4 months to a dedicated group of 14 individuals who are the BeFriender team. These 14 people were commissioned on June 25, 2006.

Some of the topics covered in training were as follows:

- Christians' call to ministry
- The attitude of befriending
- Active listening skills; attending, following, & responding
- How to conduct a befriending visit
- Acting in the name of the faith community
- Roles & responsibilities within BeFriender group
- A small group process for learning from ministry
- Confidentiality

The BeFriender Leadership team is comprised of Rev. Joanie Delamater, Rev. Andrew Jensen and Cathryn Bashore. They also provide supervision, support, and coordination of continuing education and training to the group. BeFrienders meet monthly to learn from each other, support each other and enhance their skills. Since the commissioning in June, the BeFrienders have provided support to at least 20 people with a total of approximately 150 contacts.

Healing Ministry

Lay participation in our Healing Ministry at St. John's began in 2006 with the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and training from Rev. Joanie and Fr Andy. It was fitting that the first four lay members were commissioned on Pentecost.

Since Pentecost, lay members have ministered with clergy at the healing station on Sunday mornings and during the healing service on Wednesday evenings. In addition, members of the healing team have visited parishioners in hospitals and homes, and they have held healing sessions on Wednesday evenings and Sunday mornings, per parishioner requests.

Members of the Healing Ministry share personal, interpersonal, and community practices of prayer,

study, meditation, sharing, listening, and supportive service. Members communicate frequently with each other and meet monthly as a team. Several of the members have completed a 5-course program in Healing Touch Spiritual Ministry, and they often share Healing Touch practices with other members of the team.

In the fall of 2006, the team grew spiritually in four ways: sharing a team retreat, sponsoring the second annual Spiritual Spa, inviting new members to the ministry, and creating a private space for healing touch sessions. We look ahead to 2007 with joy, hope, and confidence that the Spirit will continue to lead and bless this ministry.

Throughout the year I watched St. John's youthful cadre, spearheaded by Alison and her army of

This year began with my absence from St. John's as I recovered from thyroid cancer surgery and treatment. Though I was not physically present until the first week in February, my prayers were with this amazing faith community. I am still full of gratitude for your thoughts, cards, jokes, prayers and meals during my healing time.

When I returned to work, my schedule changed to Wednesdays 1-9 pm, Fridays 9-5 and Sunday mornings. My position as associate priest is still 20 hours a week. The focus of my ministry in 2006 was on healing and wholeness and pastoral care. I worked on building a healing team of laypersons to join the clergy in laying on hands and anointing during the Sunday services and Wednesday evenings. Fr. Andy Jensen and Dianne DelGiorno assisted me in training those interested in the healing ministry over a four-

Joy. Dianne DelGiorno started the day off with humor and the power of storytelling (the liturgy of the Word). Dr. Mary Freitag, a psychologist specializing in mindfulness, joined the Spiritual Spa and led the 65 participants in mindfulness exercises including mindful eating. Sherri Afryl demonstrated deep breathing exercises to let go of stress and anxiety and got our bodies moving throughout the day. Colleen Johnson explained her role as a spiritual director and invited people to walk a canvas labyrinth (on the choir room floor) or to sit in the meditation garden or to write prayers. Cathryn Bashore gave a presentation on the Psalms and guided us in writing our own psalms with magnetic words, phrases, and colorful shapes. I spoke about prayer and the power of connecting with God and others through deep listening and becoming aware of the physical and spiritual world around us. The day was wrapped in music, transitioning us from one experience into another by the talented Betsy and Paul Hanson and John Sundell, musicians I have known for years through Cursillo.

To assist us in being good stewards of the earth and mindful eating, all the food and beverages offered at the Spiritual Spa were homemade and organic. Stan Kegler, husband of Dianne DelGiorno, made the soups and was in charge of the kitchen crew. Lowell Johnson and Jim Delamater assisted Stan. Joe Afryl helped with audio and video presentations.

For many the first step to joy is letting go, and we ritualized this by writing down anything we wanted to let go of emotionally, physically or

spiritually. We then burned the notes as an offering before we joyfully entered the sanctuary to complete the day with a healing Eucharist (the liturgy of the table).

Fifteen lay people were commissioned this spring as BeFriender Ministers. BeFrienders are trained lay people who assist the clergy in ongoing pastoral care. Their ministry is one of holy listening and prayerful presence. They don't fix others, but rather journey with others, one on one, as they experience grief, illness, divorce, transitions or any life crisis. Fr. Andy Jensen and I worked with this group of dedicated men and women in learning how to be present to others in crisis. The BeFrienders meet on a monthly basis for ongoing training and support with Cathryn Bashore and Fr. Andy or me. I continue to assist Fr. Mark with leading worship, preaching, teaching and administering the sacraments. I look forward to continuing my work with the Lay Eucharistic Ministers, the Good Grief Group and with helping new members become involved in our many ministries at St. John in the Wilderness.

I am deeply grateful for renewed health, the amazing staff here and the opportunity to serve the people of God at St. John in the Wilderness.
